Course Information:

Studying Law gives students an understanding of the role of Law in today's society and raises their awareness of the rights and responsibilities of individuals. By learning about legal rules and how and why they apply to real life, students also develop their analytical ability, decision making, critical thinking and problem-solving skills. All these skills are highly sought after by higher education providers and employers.

Assessment: Three exam papers, two hours each at the end of year 13.

Futures:

An A Level in Law will allow you to continue your studies at university. The subject is highly regarded by the Russell group of universities and complements very well with most A-Level subjects.
