

How has the grading for GCSE subjects changed?



- 2 year qualifications
- Students will achieve 1 grade for each subject except if they are studying combined science when they will get 2 qualifications
- If students do not achieve at least a grade 4 in English (language or literature) &/or maths they will have to continue their studies when they leave at the end of Y11
- Most Sixth Form providers will expect at least a Grade 5 to move onto A-levels, many will ask for Grade 6 or Grade 7 in certain subjects
- The next two years are about making sure your child has choices at the end of Y11

My child is worried about exams – what support Thornton will there be for them?



- The more often your child practices sitting exams, the easier it will be for them in Summer 2024
- Y10
 - 20th February 27th February Assessment 1 partial papers position in year group studying this subject.
 - 23rd March Y10 progress evening all families need to attend
 - 12th June 21st June Assessment 2 full papers in exam hall conditions for some subjects – Grade given for all subjects
- Y11
 - After October half term 2 weeks full mock exams
 - After February half term 2 weeks full mock exams
 - Exams start May 2024

Approximately 60 weeks in school until the GCSE exams start for Y10





My child is worried about exams – what support will there be for them?



- Mock exams will help us identify which students need addition support above any access arrangements that they may already have
 - If students do not use this support they may loose it in their final exams
- It also allows them to understand how the exams will run

Summarise content into single words. Then use these words to rewrite the content.



Mind-map It

Choose a section of the knowledge organiser to mindmap from memory Add categories, colour, questions and layers of thinking about the information.



Look, Cover, Write, Check

Choose a section and look, trying to remember it. Cover it up. Write it out. Check what you missed and add it in



Connect It

Find connections between ideas. vocabulary or facts on the knowledge organiser. How many connections can you find between them?



Quiz It

Write yourself a quiz based on the KO. Come back to it another day and see if you can enswer it from memory. Red pen your answers.



Students will be sat regular homework using the 9 study skills – little and often revision.

Preparation will help students with their anxiety about exams.

To access homework, students can take two routes.




Route 1: log in with school e-mail address and password through the Learning Dashboard.

3. Log-in using your school email address and password.





Attendance – every day, every lesson every minute counts



Excellent attendance at school is vital to help children achieve and get the best possible start in life. Children who frequently miss school often fall behind.

Research suggests that Pupils with **no absence** are 1.3 times more likely to achieve level 4 or above, and 3.1 times more likely to achieve level 5 or above, than pupils that missed 10-15% of all sessions.


Pupils with **no absence** are 2.2 times more likely to achieve 5+ GCSEs grade 4 or above or equivalent including English and mathematics than pupils that missed 15-20% of KS4 lessons.

In addition, good attendance at school shows potential employers that a young person is reliable and is something requested when writing references.











Your child will have to remember a lot of information over the next 18 months for a lot of different subjects. This is tested in a small period of time. We want to make sure they are fully prepared!







On average, students will sit a total of 20 - 22 exams at the end of Year 11, over a short period of time.







Success doesn't come from what you do occasionally, but what you do consistently.

The GCSEs are 18 months away, when should my child start studying for their exams?

It is never too early to start preparing for the final examinations. Establishing good study habits now will mean that your child will be in a much better position for assessment at the end of cycle 2 and cycle 3.





How can I help my child establish good study habits?

- > Don't let your child tell you that they have nothing to do.
- > They will always have homework do not let them tell you otherwise!
- > Even after homework has been completed, there is still lots that can be done to help support them e.g. review work on Teams, GCSE Bitesize
- > Their final grades will not only depend on how many hours of revision they do but also how well they use this time.
- > It is never too soon to start establishing good study habits.







Make sure they are ready to study

Having a suitable place to study at home is important – start this now for completing homework to establish good habits.

Ensure they have the necessary books, stationery and equipment before they start.

- Pens, pencils, ruler, protractor, compass, calculator, A4 writing pads.
- □Other useful things to provide include record cards, highlighters, coloured pens/ pencils, folders, dividers, sticky notes, kitchen timer.
- Subject specific revision guides are useful.

Why are mocks so important?

- They familiarise students with the pressure of exams
- The harder your child works for mock exams the more useful the feedback that they get will be.
- They inform teachers about what needs to happen next.
- > Tweaks to your child's technique (how they approach the questions) can make a big difference to how well they do



Digital distractions



- > If your child's phone is constantly pinging when they are studying you will need to intervene.
- > This is the biggest problem faced by students today.
- > There are good apps for dealing with digital distractions:
 - ➤ Apple users 'Self control' app
 - ➤ Android users 'Self control for study' app
 - Windows users 'cold turkey' app
- > These apps allow students to block websites for a predetermined period of time. Do you know how much time they spend on their phone?
- > Once the block is put in place, it can't be bypassed until the specified time period is up. Even deleting the app won't override it!





Bedtime

- > Having a good night's sleep is vital.
- > Whilst some time spent on phones or games consoles is fine for a limited amount of time, staying up half the night should definitely be avoided!



CALM AND FOCUSSED



- > This will be a difficult and challenging year, but we (school and home) need to keep them driven and engaged.
- > Remind them of the long-term benefits.
- > Paint them a picture of success and keep on reminding them of it!
- > We all want them to be successful and by helping your child establish good study habits now, you can really play your part.

- Most apprentices stay with their employer beyond the apprenticeship (or at least have this option).
- Develops employability skills giving an advantage in the competitive job market.



Support for your child



Careers Advisor – Kiran

All students will have a 1:1 careers conversation with Kiran in year 11. She is based in the library on Monday's and Friday's. Kiran will support students with their choices for life after year 11 and prepare them for applications and interviews. Students can see her now if they want to, just ask Mrs Bulmer to arrange an appointment.

CEIAG Co Ordinator – Mrs Bulmer

Mrs Bulmer is attached to year 11 every year but plans the tutorial sessions for year 10's and year 11's. If students have any questions they can find her in F11 at break or after school.

Librarian – Miss Billingsley

Miss Billingsley will support students applying for further education if needed. She is able to sit with students during the application process, read through any statements or help browse different courses. This help is available at lunch time or after school.

Form tutors and other staff in school

Students are able to talk to any member of staff in school to discuss potential pathways. They can ask teaching staff about careers that are related to their subject if it interests them and what qualifications they might need.



Thornton What students can do now



- Consider all the different post-16 options
 - Think about what type of learning your child wants to do after year 11
- Do research so that they can make an informed decision
 - Students can visit any post-16 provider even if they're not in year 11 yet
- Always have a back up plan
 - If your child knows they want to study Engineering at college, then they need to have different colleges in mind, not just one
- Think about what is right for THEM and THEIR future
 - Don't let your child be influenced by where their friends are going
- Think about where they'd like to apply so when applications open they can apply straight away
 - This is usually around Christmas of year 11






Beckfoot Thornton

- Smoothwall software monitors all electronic devices (including school laptops at home) for safeguarding risks.
- Alerts are raised for all types of bullying, abuse and harassment, swearing, sexualised language, grooming, self-harm/suicide, radicalisation, threats of violence, substance abuse and gang culture.
- The service operates 24 hours a day, 365 days a year.





7) Don't avoid difficult conversations about sexting and sharing nude pictures



What the law says

Sexting can be seen as harmless, but creating or sharing explicit images of a child is illegal, even if the person doing it is a child. A young person is breaking the law if they:

- take an explicit photo or video of themselves or a friend
- share an explicit image or video of a child, even if it's shared between children of the same age
- possess, download or store an explicit image or video of a child, even if the child gave their permission for it to be created.

However, as of January 2016 in England and Wales, if a young person is found creating or sharing images, the police can choose to record that a crime has been committed but that taking formal action isn't in the public interest.

8) Encourage children to talk - make sure that children can tell you if they see anything that worries them online including bullying or inappropriate content
